








CRUISING GROUP HISTORY BOOK LAUNCH

The 25th Birthday of the Cruising Group was the impetus we needed to have the Cruising Group History written. Members of the committee had been talking for a few years that it was something we should do while our current mem-

bership includes some of the original participants.

John Mowson, the founding Chairman, attended the 24th birthday cruise and over lunch last year I chatted to him and David Pollard as to the origins of the Cruising Group.

This was the beginning point for Pam Merritt to take it further as a project for the year. With Lyn Bingham researching Annual Reports and early newsletters being dug out of the RBYC archives the history began to unfold. Old pictures were scanned to turn them into something useable in the digital age. Thought was put into how best to put all this information together.

Trish Jefferies, cruising group member and skilled graphic designer turned this information into a professional, readable and entertaining booklet. The annual festive season put some stress on the deadline as printers stop working over the Christmas /New Year but working long hours some days and even taking it on an Avanning holiday (where the fellow Avanners said to just 'make it up"!) enabled the history to












MONITORING THE GAS BOTTLE WITH A TIGER TAIL



For those of us who do not have an electrically-operated gas-bottle solenoid, sometimes there is a tendency to forget to turn off the gas at the bottle immediately after use. Possibly this is because it means getting into the cockpit, where it may be wet, cold, raining and/or dark. (Maybe it is a bit like remembering a dental appointment. My dentist now sends an SMS text message as a reminder).

Of course, the gas should be switched on at the bottle only immediately prior to use, and most importantly switched off at the gas bottle immediately after use. Being so disciplined can save a very Big Bang! I think that a reminder that the gas is still switched on at the bottle is a very useful asset on any boat. It is an obvious idea, but I have not seen the following tell-tail reminder used on any boat except my own.

The "equipment" simply consists of a yellow fabric tape (in my case obtained from a florist) which is attached to the gas bottle, and pulled out of the gas-bottle locker before switching on the gas. After switching off the gas, the tape is hidden away out of sight by replacing it in the gas locker. The yellow tape is very visible by day, but I have added black stripes to increase the contrast, necessary for better visibility in poor lighting conditions. The yellow colour has faded with time.

Incidentally, a couple of half turns is all that is required to turn the gas on. Tell your crew "If you are turning off the gas and it takes more than a couple of half turns, then ask



yourself 'Am I turning it the right way?' ". (Unfortunately I have discovered a few crews who do not know the difference between clockwise and anticlockwise!)

You might also remind the crew that, when turning off the gas, slight pressure is all that is required. Excessive pressure

will brutalised the rubber seal, which will then cease to function and leak gas - which is what we were trying to avoid.

Editors Note: On *Chakana* we have our own Tiger Tail to tell us if the sail tie used to prevent the reefing line tapping on the boom has been removed. It is important to be removed before unfurling the mainsail.

The names of all the Cherry boats have had Wagnerian origins (except "Billabong" which had acquired such a splendid reputation under her previous owner/designer Peter Joubert that one couldn't dream of changing her name) so that when we bought another Joubert designed yacht, a Cape Barren Goose, (and hence the Goose on her bow) we followed our tradition.

Magdalena is the nursemaid in Wagner's Mastersingers of Nuremberg and she first made her appearance in Munich in 1868, she was known by the apprentices in the opera as "Lena". She is of uncertain age, of uncertain morals, very broad in the beam, and very kind to the young apprentices – so what could be more appropriate.

She is the large lady in the centre of the picture, not the young and beautiful Eva who is on the right with the hero Walther.
