Fifty-four people gathered in the Olympic Room on 16 January 2021 to celebrate 30 successful years of informative meetings and on-water activities for which the RBYC Cruising Group is recognised as being one of the most active in the bay.

Following a survey of boats in the marina by David Pollard in late 1990, a group of like-minded folk recognised that there were a substantial number of what could be called cruising boats in the marina, and there was an opportunity to involve them in organised club activities. From this, the Cruising Division was formed in 1991.

Following a welcome glass of champagne, the night opened with the current Chair of Cruising Group, Paul Jenkins, listing the impressive list of activities that the Cruising Group have conducted and continue to do so. These included monthly meetings where guest speakers present on a wide range of topics relevant to members, monthly on-water activities, a cruise into Bass Strait each February for two weeks, the annual Music Night and special projects in the club that the Group has adopted and funded. Paul also acknowledged the contributions from former committee members who attended the dinner; David Pollard, David Mattiske, Bill Westerbeek and Lyn Bingham (previous chairperson). Long serving committee members also present were acknowledged including Will Merritt (chairperson for 6 years), Pam Merritt and Jenny Collins. Previous chairpersons Rod Watson, Roger Walker and Peter Strain were also present and acknowledged.

Paul proposed a toast to recognise the success of the Group.

Entrée followed with a shared platter of Lobster Brioche Slider Rolls, Lemon Peppered Fried Calamari and Karaage Chicken to share on each of the six tables of eight or ten guests.

GRANDCHILDREN, SUMMER AND BOATS Pam Merritt



When I was a teacher school holidays were for going away. These days school holidays mean grandchildren, which raises the question of how to amuse them. My six are now between 9 and 16 years old so it's becoming more of a challenge - but in summer they love the boat.



About seven years ago we initiated the Annual Marina Treasure Hunt, which involves kids running around the Marina with clipboards answering a set of questions from each row (eg. Row 5: Motto of JAMHU, Boat with biggest wheel? What's Looking Good made of?). Sometimes there are clues in envelopes hidden round the Marina - near boats, under steps, taped onto light pedestals etc. When they were little I used to ride a bike around keeping an eye on them, didn't want any dramas on 'grandma's watch'. These days they just disappear until finished, or hungry or thirsty. The questions / challenges are becoming more sophisticated the older they get so can take an hour or two. The Treasure Hunt finishes at Andalucia with clues to help find the 'treasure'. Over the years it's been hidden in the anchor locker, raised up the mast, and this year lowered into the water in a dry bag. Couldn't believe how much weight it took to keep the bag below the surface but a weight from the dive belt finally worked.

I check with the older grandchildren each year to see if they're still keen to take part and the answer so far is a resounding yes! This year we had the added bonus of a very warm evening with the skipper of a power boat two pens up from us lending the kids his stand-

up paddle board. Kept them amused for ages, especially when you add his Portuguese Water Dog into the mix. Taking grandchildren out for a sail is popular too, especially if it involves steering the boat, reporting changes in instrument readings or pulling on a sheet rope. Also a hit - anchoring somewhere for a swim off the boat if the weather's good. So if you have grandchildren AND a boat we can recommend combining the two for some fun times for all.

VALE JOHN MOWSON

The Founding Chairman of the RBYC Cruising Group

John Mowson, the Founding Chairman of the RBYC Cruising Group passed away peacefully on the 25th January. John was heading towards his 90th birthday. Jill, his wife for the past 68 years, reported this information to David Pollard who was also involved with the formation of the Cruising Division 30 years ago.

John was a talented musician with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra and a passionate sailor before moving to Western Australia where he continued playing for the WASO and sailing at Royal Perth Yacht Club.

A seed of an idea - How Cruising Group Began

The following is an excerpt from the 2015 February edition of the Cruising Newsletter, written by Robina Smith after chatting with John Mowson at the Birthday Cruise in 2015. This formed the basis of the first chapter of the Cruising History Book that was published in 2016 for the Cruising Group's 25th Birthday and outlines how the Cruising Group began and the part that John Mowson played in its formation.

It seems that the birth of the Cruising Group came about when likeminded people came together with their ideas and common interest.

In 1990 David Pollard was a member of the sailing committee representing the 2nd Division. He did a survey of the yachts in the marina to form a yachting register classifying the yachts into 3 Divisions. However, while conducting the survey he found a group of yachts that weren't racing, but were basically cruising yachts, and so placed this group into an informal Cruising Division.

Meanwhile, John Mowson had been reading about Cruising Groups in yachting magazines and this sowed the seed in his mind that RBYC could have a Cruising Group.

Ian Twentyman, the Commodore of RBYC at the time, was in favour of the idea and supported the formation of the Cruising Division as part of the Sailing Committee. He, John Mowson and Jim Patton used to have morning tea out on the marina on John's boat 'Greenouch' with David Pollard joining in after a time. This was when the discussion started about forming the Cruising Division and the activities they could organise.

Miriam and Brian Cherry were racing at the time in third division and cruising occasionally along the northern Bass Strait coast. They had just purchased Peter Joubert's 'Billabong' and were keen to extend their cruising further offshore – so they joined in.

John Mowson became the Founding Chairman of this group with a common interest called 'Cruising Division' and a number of successful bay trips were held. John spent 18 months as Chairman before moving to Perth, and recalled that in those early days he personally rang interested cruisers to make things happen.

John and Jill both played instruments in the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra – leading double bass and bassoon. He, along with David Mattiske who was also in this core group in the Cruising Division had the idea of a Classical Musical Night as they shared an interest in the MSO. However the first Classical Music Evening organised by David Mattiske was not held until 1995.

The first official sail of the newly formed Cruising Division was to RYCV in January 1991, where 25-30 boats and about 80 members sailed to Williamstown and enjoyed a barbeque on the lawn in perfect weather. This event has been celebrated as the official start of the Cruising Group, with a birthday BBQ to Royals on the third Sunday in January ever since.
